The History of Everyday Life Alf Ludtke, 2018-11-20 Alltagsgeschichte or the history of everyday life emerged during the 1980s as the most interesting new field among West German historians and more recently their East German colleagues. Partly in reaction to the modernization theory pervading West German social history in the 1970s practitioners of alltagsgeschichte stressed the complexities of popular experience paying particular attention for instance to the relationship of the German working class to Nazism. Now the first English translation of a key volume of essays Alltagsgeschichte Zur Rekonstruktion historischer Erfahrungen und Lebensweisen presents this approach and shows how it cuts across the boundaries of established disciplines. The result is a work of great methodological theoretical and historiographical significance as well as a substantive contribution to German studies. Introduced by Alf Ludtke the volume includes two empirical essays one by Lutz Niethammer on life courses of East Germans after 1945 and one by Ludtke on modes of accepting fascism among German workers. The remaining five essays are theoretical. Hans Medick writes on ethnological ways of knowledge as a challenge to social history. Peter Schöttler on mentalities ideologies and discourses and alltagsgeschichte. Dorothee Wierling on gender relations and alltagsgeschichte. Wolfgang Kaschuba on popular culture and workers culture as symbolic orders and Harald Dehne on the challenge alltagsgeschichte posed for Marxist Leninist historiography in East Germany. Schreier, 2019-06-06 Despite the nearly three decades since German reunification there remains little understanding of the ways in which experiences overlapped across East West divides. German Division as Shared Experience considers everyday life across the two Germanies using perspectives from history literary and cultural studies anthropology and art history to explore how interconnections as well as fractures between East and West Germany after 1945 were experienced lived and felt. Through its novel approach to historical method the volume points to new understandings of the place of narrative form and lived sensibility in shaping Germans simultaneously shared and separate experiences of belonging during forty years of division from 1945 to 1990. **Emotional Experience and Microhistory** Sigurður Gylfi Magnússon, 2020-05-11 Emotional

Experience and Microhistory explores the life and death of Magnús Hj Magnússon through his diary poetry and other writing showing how best to use the methods of microhistory to address complicated historical situations. The book deals with the many faces of microhistory and applies its methodology to the life of the Icelandic destitute pauper poet Magnús Hj Magnússon 1873-1916. Having left his foster home at the age of 19 in 1892 he lived a peripatetic existence in an unstinting struggle with poor health together with a ceaseless quest for a space to pursue writing and scholarship in accord with his dreams. He produced and accumulated a huge quantity of sources autobiography diary poems reflections which are termed by the author as egodocuments. The book demonstrates how these egodocuments can be applied systematically revealing unexpected perspectives on his life and demonstrating how integration of diverse sources can open up new perspectives on complex and

difficult subjects In so doing the author offers an understanding both of how Magnusson's story has been told and how it can give insight into such matters as gender relations and sexual life and the history of emotions Highlighting how the historiographical development of modern scholarship has shaped scholars' ideas about egodocuments and microhistory around the world the book is of great use and interest to scholars of microhistory social and cultural modern history literary theory anthropology and ethnology

Exhibiting the Nazi Past Chloe Paver, 2018-08-21 This book is the first full length study of the museum object as a memory medium in history exhibitions about the Nazi era the Second World War and the Holocaust Over recent decades German and Austrian exhibition makers have engaged in significant programmes of object collection often in collaboration with witnesses and descendants At the same time exhibition makers have come to recognise the degree to which the National Socialist era was experienced materially through the loss acquisition imposition destruction and re purposing of objects In the decades after 1945 encounters with material culture from the Nazi past continued both within the family and in the public sphere In analysing how these material engagements are explored in the museum the book not only illuminates a key aspect of German and Austrian cultural memory but contributes to wider debates about relationships between the human and object worlds
