

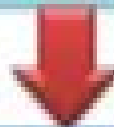

Social Theories of the Press Hanno Hardt, 2001-10-11 Hanno Hardt has thoroughly revised and expanded his pre history of communication research in the United States With the notable addition of Karl Marx's journalism focused writings and a new foreword by James W Carey this edition covers intellectual contributions from several German theorists in the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries as well as first generation U S sociologists who were influenced by this scholarship A new concluding chapter explores the continuing influence of German social thought and the contemporary shift of paradigms in U S communication research including approaches such as critical Marxist and cultural studies
