

NATURE VS NURTURE

Nature versus nurture is an ongoing debate about the degree to which human behaviour is determined by genetic inheritance (nature) or learned through interactions with the environment (nurture).

NURTURE

Explanations suggesting behaviour is determined by the environment and personal experiences. They believe all human characteristics are a result of social and material environmental factors that influence development from birth onwards.

Petrie, M. (1920) conducted a case study on a child known as 'Little Albert' to see if it was possible to condition a child to fear an innocuous object.

- Little Albert showed no fear response to any stimulus before the experiment.
- Little Albert was presented with a white rat. Each time he reached for it, a loud noise was played (unconditioned stimulus). Albert responded to the rat alone crying and rapidly 'locking' away, which took him to his crying fit.
- The fear had been transferred to other looking objects, including a rabbit and a fur coat.
- One month later, Albert continued to show fear reactions to all similar objects. This provided evidence that the environment can manipulate to create a phobic response and behavioural change.

Zimbardo (1972) conducted the Stanford Prison Experiment to investigate the effects that roles and the environment can have on people's behaviour.

- 24 male volunteers were randomly assigned to the role of 'prisoner' or 'guard'.
- A simulated prison was built in the basement of the psychology building at Stanford University.
- Guards were given authority, uniforms, batons, whistles and dominantly in the body of control and power.
- As a result, guards beat their 'prisoners', used abusive language, imposed arbitrary rules and easily adopted other behaviours.
- Their behaviour had no been accepted after just six days.

The Humanistic Approach – believes their behaviour is influenced by their personal and environmental self-world.

The Behaviourist Approach – behaviour is learned through a process of conditioning.

The Social Approach – explores how people's behaviour is influenced by other person's off culture.

PROBLEMS WITH THE NATURE VS NURTURE DEBATE

1. It is reductionist because it states that behaviour is solely caused by genetic factors or experience.
2. It is deterministic because it suggests behaviour is determined by hereditary factors, while environmental suggest that behaviour is the result of interactions with the environment.
3. It is difficult to control variables. For example, the variables in this study could not be known for sure if they were valid. All influences cannot be isolated.

NATURE

Naturalists argue that behaviour is caused by innate characteristics that are passed down our ancestors and form our genetic make-up. They believe genes play a role in our behaviour because we are programmed from birth, and innate behaviours are generalised to us through our family tree.

Genes and Twins (1980) involved twin and adoption studies to determine whether先天性 or genetic link.

Adoption studies found an increased occurrence of schizophrenia in adopted children with schizophrenic parents. Children of schizophrenic parents showed higher evidence of schizophrenia. This indicates a significant genetic input into the onset of schizophrenia.

Twin studies found a higher concordance rate for schizophrenia in identical twins than non-identical twins. On average, there is a 50% probability that both individuals in a pair will have a certain characteristic, given that one of them has that characteristic. Interestingly, there was a concordance rate of 50% in identical twins, compared to 12% in non-identical twins.

Phenome (1980) found that the overall heritability of IQ is identical and monozygous twins, which means identical twins share 100% of their genes. However, when only identical twins that have adopted were studied, the heritability rate increased to 0.74, which means they share 74% of their genetic coding. Genetic influence appears to be stronger than environmental influence.

The Biological Approach – believes behaviour is controlled by the brain acting off other factors and influences systems.

NATURE AND NURTURE INTERACTION

Psychologists generally agree that behaviour is a result of the interaction between nature and nurture.

Psychologists believe that either genes or environment can control behaviour, but they are part of a system. In fact, they are controlled by each other.

Margulis et al. (2000) conducted a study on black swans and found that they believed that behaviour was a result of their environment and their genes.

The Psychodynamic Approach – looks at unconscious and childhood experiences that have shaped the individual's behaviour.

The Cognitive Approach – focuses on how people process information to make sense of the world.

The Developmental Approach – explores how behaviour changes over time and how it is influenced by experiences.
