## Te Tao Ching:

*Lao-Tzu: Te-Tao Ching* Robert G. Henricks, 2010-11-24 Lao tzu's Te Tao Ching has been treasured for thousands of years for its poetic statement of life's most profound and elusive truths. Although the Te Tao Ching is widely read, the author's enigmatic style and the less than perfect condition of the Chinese originals make many of its brief poems difficult to understand. So readers of fine literature hailed the discovery in 1973 of two copies of the Te Tao Ching which had been buried in 168 B.C. These manuscripts are more than five centuries older than any others known and they correct many defects of later versions; their grammar and vocabulary frequently make the classic easier to understand; lost lines are restored as many as three in some poems; some sections follow a more logical sequence. Such differences make it necessary to reevaluate traditional interpretations of the Te Tao Ching and Professor Henricks has done this in an extensive commentary to his excellent new translation. In addition, Professor Henricks has provided an introduction that explains the basics of Taoism and discusses the many other important finds from Ma-wang-tui.

**Tao Te Ching** Laozi, 1996-05-07 Dating for around 300 B.C. this is an early work of the Chinese school of philosophy called Taoism. It offers a complete view of the cosmos and how human beings should respond to it. It has mystical insight into the nature of things and forms a basis for a humane morality and political utopia.

**TAO TE CHING** Lao Tse, 2024-10-02 The Tao Te Ching attributed to Laozi is a classic text of Chinese philosophy that explores themes such as the nature of the universe, harmony, and the balance between opposites. Laozi emphasizes the idea that true wisdom comes from simplicity, acceptance, and effortless action, wu wei, encouraging the pursuit of inner peace through understanding the natural flow of life. The text critiques attachment to power, control, and material ambitions, suggesting that virtue manifests in those who act with modesty, humility, and compassion. For Laozi, governing oneself and others wisely requires refraining from forced interference and trusting in the natural development of things.

**The Wisdom of Laotse** Lin Yutang, 2020-01-28 Laotse's real name is Lao Tan, who is a great thinker and sage. In China, Lao Tse called Tao Te Ching too, as it is Laotse's only book and includes his main thought. Lao Tse's Tao Te Ching contains two parts: one part, chapter 1 to chapter 37, is Tao Ching; another part, chapter 38 to chapter 81, is Te Ching. Laotse's greatness is that his thought never constrained people's minds, and all people can learn new ideas from it and discover the essence of all things. The essence is Nature or Truth. Tao Laotse said: When the highest type of men hear the Tao truth, they try hard to live in accordance with it. When the mediocre hear the Tao, they seem to be aware and yet unaware of it. When the lowest type hear of Tao, they break into loud laughter. If it were not laughed at, it would not be Tao. I am quite sure that the reaction of the majority of readers on first looking into Laotse's book will be to laugh. I say this without any disrespect for I did that myself. The highest type of scholars end by laughing with Laotse at the preoccupations of the philosophers of the day. After that, Laotse becomes a lifelong.
