cultures are as much a mystery to mainstream society as for example the gay culture I choose not to make a difference between the words After a short introduction to the theory of subcultures and especially theory in punk and hardcore this paper aims to discuss the youth cultures similarities and differences the reasons for changes and continuity in the scene and the relation to politics Sources cited will include academic texts popular texts like Andy Greenwald s book *Nothing Feels Good Punk Rock Teenagers and Emo* as well as original voices from the scene for example collected in interviews by Beth Lahicky for her book *All Ages Reflections on Straight Edge* As music is the starting point of all discussed youth cultures there will also be comment on exemplary lyrics Most of the last chapter on the latest form of punk rock emo will be in interview style To date there is one book written on emo The author Andy Greenwald offers his readers an online messageboard to discuss his work emo and everything related to it He actively participates in the discussion and was so kind to answer my questions
