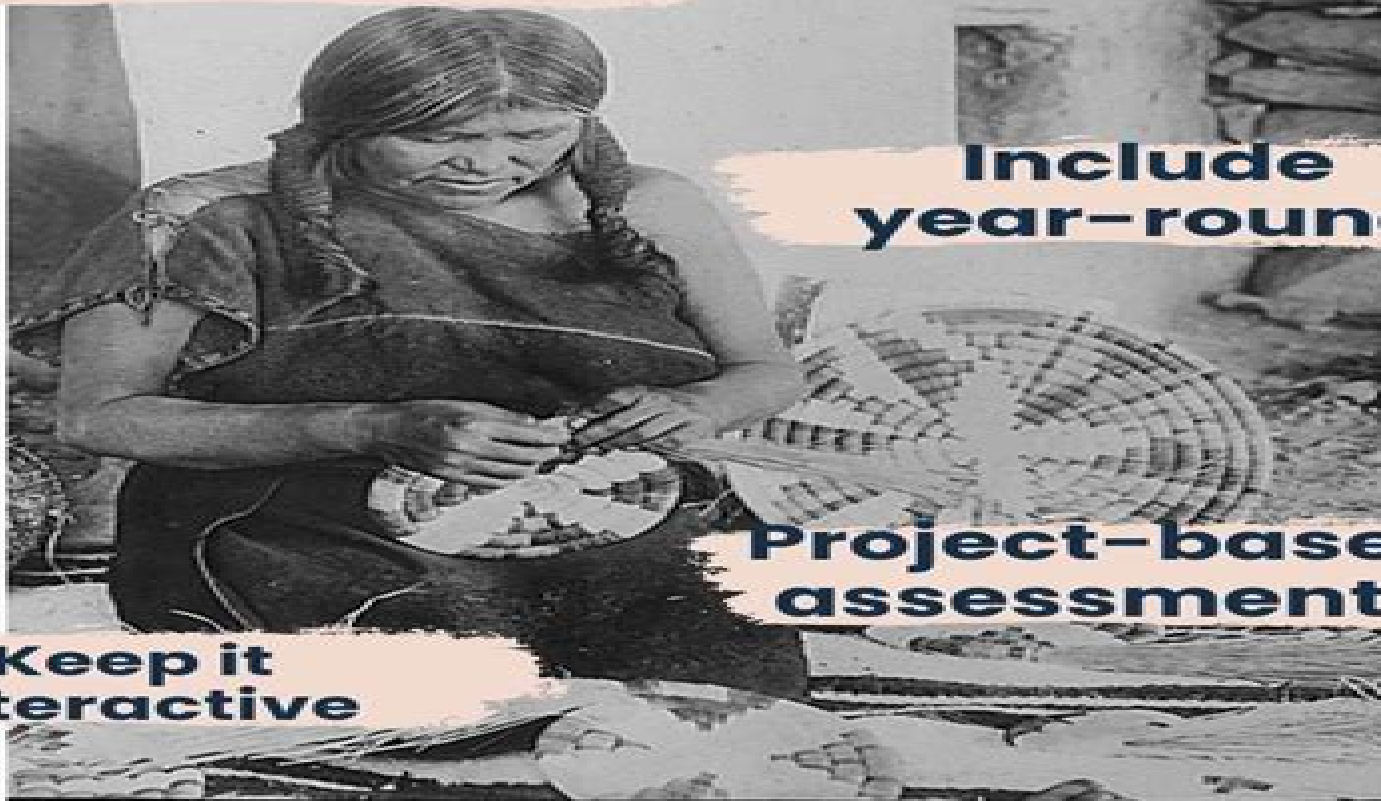

Native American while the remaining three experts have had significant long term experiences working with Native American people and learning and teaching about Native American history and culture The students were selected from the roster of students who completed a course at Penn State University entitled CED 400 Exploring Indigenous Ways of Knowing The findings from the study are a compilation of the knowledge and perspectives of the participants and may provide useful insight to curriculum designers education policy makers classroom teachers university professors of education and diversity education professionals Teaching American History Gary J.
