Wedemeyer, 2012-12-04 Making Sense of Tantric Buddhism fundamentally rethinks the nature of the transgressive theories and practices of the Buddhist Tantric traditions challenging the notion that the Tantras were marginal or primitive and situating them instead both ideologically and institutionally within larger trends in mainstream Buddhist and Indian culture Critically surveying prior scholarship Wedemeyer exposes the fallacies of attributing Tantric transgression to either the passions of lusty monks primitive tribal rites or slavish imitation of Saiva traditions Through comparative analysis of modern historical narratives that depict

Tantrism as a degenerate form of Buddhism a primal religious undercurrent or medieval ritualism he likewise demonstrates these to be stock patterns in the European historical imagination Through close analysis of primary sources Wedemeyer reveals the lived world of Tantric Buddhism as largely continuous with the Indian religious mainstream and deploys contemporary methods of semiotic and structural analysis to make sense of its seemingly repellent and immoral injunctions Innovative semiological readings of the influential Guhyasamaja Tantra underscore the text s overriding concern with purity pollution and transcendent insight issues shared by all Indic religions and a large scale quantitative study of Tantric literature shows its radical antinomianism to be a highly managed ritual observance restricted to a sacerdotal elite These insights into Tantric scripture and ritual clarify the continuities between South Asian Tantrism and broader currents in Indian religion illustrating how thoroughly these radical communities were integrated into the intellectual institutional and social structures of South Asian Buddhism
