- However, it is 2023 and in the last 3 or 4 decades, a lot of new claims and counter-claims have been made on this.
- Some of these claims will be discussed now.

Evolution

- "nothing in biology makes sense except in the light of evolution" (Dobzhansky, 1973)
- Language too makes sense in the light of evolution
- However, unlike other domains, language evolution is a little tough to track since it leaves no fossil
- Written language arguably evolved much later than spoken and signed languages.
