Rast, 2022 The theory of value structure concerns the meaning of better than and good as well as the way in which values serve as a basis for rational decision making Drawing methodologically from economics and theories of decision making the aim of serious axiology in metaethics is to do justice to problems that have puzzled philosophers of value for centuries Can value comparisons be cyclic Are all values comparable with each other and can decision makers just add up different aspects of an evaluation to determine the best course of action A Theory of Value Structure From Values to Decisions starts with a thorough introduction to the modeling of better than comparisons from a normative perspective In the philosophical part of the book Erich H Rast argues that aspects of better than comparisons can differ qualitatively so much that one aspect may outrank another Consequently the classical weighted sum aggregation model fails Values cannot always be summed up and comparisons may be fundamentally noncompensatory an indeterminacy that explains problems like the apparent nontransitivity of better than and hard cases in decision making Using a lexicographic method of value comparisons Rast develops a multidimensional theory of better than and shows how and to which extent it can be combined with standard methods of decision making under uncertainty by using rank dependent utility theory

Findlay, 2014-11-20 Professor Findlay in this book originally published in 1961 set out to justify and to some extent carry out a material value ethic ie A systematic setting forth of the ends of rational action The book is in the tradition of Moore Rashall Ross Scheler and Hartmann though it avoids altogether dogmatic intuitive methods It argues that an organised framework of ends of action follows from the attitude underlying our moral pronouncements and that this framework while allowing personal elaboration is not a matter for individual decision The relations connecting our fundamental value judgements with one another and the frames of mind behind them are not rigorously deductive but are sufficiently compelling to be called logical Something of a transcendental deduction of a well ordered family for our basic heads of valuation is both possible and necessary The work is further critical of the notion of obligation which has been extended far beyond legal contracts and understandings The book also contains a chapter on religion

Hartman, 2011-12-15 Hartman s revolutionary book introduces formal orderly thinking into value theory It identifies three basic kinds of value intrinsic goods e g people as ends in themselves extrinsic goods e g things and actions as means to ends and systemic goods conceptual values All good things share a common formal or structural pattern they fulfill the ideal standards or concepts that we apply to them Thus this theory is called formal axiology Some values are richer in good making property fulfillment than others so some desirable things are better than others and form patterned hierarchies of value How we value is just as important as what we value and evaluations like values share structures or formal patterns as this book demonstrates Hartman locates all of this solidly within the framework of historical value theory but he moves successfully and creatively beyond philosophical tradition and toward the creation of a new value science

**Ethics, Value, and Reality** Aurel Kolnai, 2017-09-29 Ethics Value and Reality is a collection of essays written after Kolnai settled in England

in 1955 These essays from Kolnai's mature years sit atop a remarkable gestation of moral and political thinking At the heart of his thought is the special role of privilege in a good social order Kolnai relies heavily on the work of late nineteenth and early twentieth century value theorists such as Alexius Meinong Nicolai Hartmann and Max Scheler He blends this continental tradition of ethics with British intuitionism and Scottish Enlightenment articulations For Kolnai ethical life cannot be adequately understood except by reference to moral emphasis and thus Kolnai can be thought of as a liberal conservative He acknowledges myriad values moral and non moral and accepts that all can have some claim upon us Low values as much as high values have a legitimate claim His is a tolerant conservatism though not for a moment does he forgo the necessity of judgment a readily graspable hierarchy keeps the respective demands of values in proportion Kolnai welcomes the call to seriousness which is the hallmark of existentialism The ground of Kolnai's thought is the idea of emotion as cognitive He saw the typical analytical philosopher's fascination with simplicity of explanation not only thoroughly refuted by the gains in understanding wrought by phenomenological method with its deference to the richness of phenomena but sensed in the monistic inclination he dreaded a harbinger of totalitarianism Never denying his emotionalism he nonetheless made his points well enough by adopting an analytical approach to philosophy and ethics This is a major work crossing moral and political philosophy
